
Student from the Kantonsschule Wohlen in Leuven - EYP

It was Saturday, the 18th of March 2023, when I, at last, arrived at the Zaventem Airport in Belgium. For once, nobody was on strike, allowing my trip to be quite enjoyable indeed. Due to my early

arrival, I got the opportunity to go meet up with people that I grew close to during my last EYP Session in Belgium, which was almost precisely a year ago, namely Antwerp 2022. It felt good to see the people I formed deep connections with again; EYP really builds connections and makes friendships happen! Well, after the first few days of spending time exploring Belgium, the week and, therefore, the Session started.



Luckily, I got the opportunity to travel to Leuven, the city of this National Session, with another delegation. The atmosphere was optimal, we were prepared, and we felt accomplished after the intense rounds of debate.

Kurzbericht EYP RS Zurich

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My first time as an EYP Organizer began way before the Session started. I had been thinking about joining as an Official for a while, and I got the opportunity to when I heard the calls for Organizers of the Regional Session were out. To give you a rough time overview, it was about six months before the actual Session, which was from the 31st of March to the 2nd of April.



Filling out the application form was interesting; their questions are always highly thought-provoking. Waiting for an answer, though, was the real nerve-wracking part. To my joy and happiness, the answer I received was positive, and so I joined the Organizing Team of the RS Zurich 2023.

Good to know, is that a Regional Session is a Session before a National one, like a small preparation Session. These Sessions are smaller in size than National ones, as well as shorter, plus there are two every year. The quality is the same, though!

Organizing was a hard task, as it did take its time next to schoolwork. We all had different tasks pre-session; I was responsible for In-kind and partially for Cooperation Fundraising, which I did — I'd say- successfully. Actually, I am not completely sure what information I may write down here and what information I may not, but I can say that during Fundraising, you send many, many Emails, whereas more than half get rejected. What I learned, though, was how to talk to companies you want to collaborate with - be it on the phone after I just woke up or by mail - how to fundraise, and how to organize an event with over 100 participants. During the progress, you are, of course, supported. We had two very understanding and lovely head organizers, both experienced in



the European Youth Parliament and ready to guide us while organizing the Session, still leaving us with enough freedom to be original, though.

The Session itself was, as an Organizer, quite stressful; I learned that one often underestimates the work of the Organizers. It consisted of taking care of issues, making sure the time schedule was kept, making sure everyone's needs were met, keeping people hydrated and full, providing a clean venue and (complete) transfers, and generally being the reason for a smooth session. Even though stressful, I loved the Session and my role as an Organizer, it taught me a lot of skills I would not have had the chance to learn elsewhere.
